



Minor Bulbs

- Winter Aconite:** A small Eurasian woodlander with glossy yellow buttercups that open during the first mild days of late winter, much to the delight of awakening honeybees.
- Snow Crocus:** Typically pinkish-purple, these are some of the earliest crocus, and they spread beautifully to quickly cover a garden bed or lawn.
- Siberian Squill:** Small clusters of flowers appear atop 4-inch-tall stems in early spring. The nodding, cup-shaped blooms are typically sky-blue with darker mid-ribs.
- White Siberian Squill:** White flowers appear on this plant instead of blue.
- Glory-of-the-Snow:** Close relatives of Siberian squill, these little bulbs are similar in their ornamental effect and bloom time, but the starry flowers are larger and face skyward. Color variants include pink, purple, and white.
- Grape Hyacinth:** Tight conical flower clusters that resemble bunches of miniature grapes are borne atop 4- to 6-inch stems in all shades of blue (depending on the variety), as well as white and pink. The most commonly offered species – *Muscari armeniacum* – is an enthusiastic naturalizer, self-sowing abundantly in sunny, well-drained sites. Flowers appear in early spring.
